

IU Geriatrics Welcomes Dr. Kofi Quist to the Faculty

IU Geriatrics welcomed new faculty member **Kofi Kafui Quist, MD**, in August. Why did he choose IU?

Dr. Quist comes to Indiana University from the Albert Einstein College of Medicine at Montefiore Medical Center in Bronx, New York, where he



completed a geriatrics fellowship. Dr. Quist completed medicine residencies in Ghana and at the Metropolitan Hospital Center's New York Medical College where he was the outstanding PGY3 resident in internal medicine.

As to his geriatric medicine clinical interests, Dr. Quist notes that the areas that excite him most are taking care of the acutely ill frail elders and

polypharmacy.

"It has always been rewarding to me to see sick elders transitioned back to their usual functional state after an acute illness without any negative sequelae as a result of their illness. Most of our elders are on multiple medications which predisposes them to the negative effects of these drugs. Reviewing, simplifying and eliminating unneeded medications is one of my passions."

Dr. Quist joins IU as an assistant professor of clinical medicine. He



provides outpatient consultative geriatric care at the Senior Health Center and inpatient care in the Acute Care for Elders (ACE) Consult Service, both at Methodist Hospital.

Dr. Quist is a member of the American College of Physicians and the American Geriatrics Society. He is certified as an internist by the American Board of Internal Medicine and will take the Geriatric Medicine subspecialty certification exam in November of this year.

Dr. Callahan Begins New R01, Alzheimer's Disease Multiple Intervention Trial Project

In a five year study funded by the National Institute on Aging, **Chris Callahan**, **MD** is building on a previous R01 clinical trial that demonstrated the effectiveness of collaborative care for older adults with Alzheimer's disease cared for in primary care practices.

The trial demonstrated that guideline-level medical care resulted in improved quality of care and improved behavioral and psychological symptoms over one year among patients and their caregivers, but the findings did not reveal a significant difference between groups in functional decline. Both study groups experienced a significant decline in function over 18 months.

The new study, the Alzheimer's Disease Multiple Intervention Trial Project, will test a home-based



intervention specifically designed to slow the rate of functional decline among older adults with Alzheimer's disease

In addition to building on Dr. Callahan's past research, the study also builds from reported research which demonstrates the short-term efficacy of home-based occupational therapy interven-

tions among older adults with dementia. Previous trials have shown that older adults with dementia, including Alzheimer's disease, can both participate in and benefit from occupational therapy-based interventions delivered in the home. ADMIT will test a home-based intervention specifically designed to slow the rate of functional decline among older adults with Alzheimer's disease.

The ADMIT R01 will conduct a two-year, randomized, controlled clinical trial to improve functioning among older adults with Alzheimer's disease comparing a control group receiving best practices primary care with an intervention group receiving best practice primary care PLUS a home-based occupational therapy intervention.

The study team will test the primary hypothesis that subjects with Alzheimer's disease in the intervention group will have improved function at two years compared with the best practice primary care control group.

IU RESPECT Center Advances Science Via Collaborative Interdisciplinary Community

Despite increased attention to palliative and end-of-life care over the past two decades, there remains a pressing need to advance the science through foundational descriptive work and innovative intervention research to grow the science.

The mission of the Indiana University Research in Palliative and End-of-Life Communication and Training (IU RESPECT) Center is to build a collaborative, interdisciplinary scientific community of researchers and clinicians to work together to advance the science of communication in palliative and end-of-life care across the lifespan.

Sachs, MD. Among ten additional core faculty members are Alexia Torke, MD, MS and Barbara Habermann, PhD.

"The IU RESPECT Center is focusing on research to improve communication in the care of children, adolescents, adults, and elders facing serious illness that is life-limiting, debilitating, or terminal," notes Dr. Hickman.

The Key Goals

- Accelerate the development of innovative descriptive and intervention research trials relevant to communication and decisionmaking in children, adolescents, adults, and elders with serious and/or life-threatening illness
- Develop new community partnerships for translational science to enhance palliative and end-of-life care research and practice
- Create mentorship opportunities for developing scholars who will become the next generation of productive, passionate palliative and end-of-life care researchers

"We will capitalize on the complementary and expanding expertise at IU and will serve as a connection point for researchers and clinicians to support and promote our mission."

IU RESPECT CENTER CALL for PILOT PROPOSALS

The Center will award two pilot projects, each worth up to \$15,000, with a starting date of January 1, 2011. All teaching and research faculty at IUPUI who are qualified to apply for NIH funding are eligible. Preference will be given to new investigators and to research that fosters transdisciplinary collaboration.
